Dear Area 74

As I reach the end of my time as your Area 74 Panel 74 Delegate, my heart is overflowing. There are no words big enough for what these past two years have meant to me. Serving you has not just been an honor — it has been a gift that changed me, softened me, and brought me closer to the person God always intended me to become.

To the past delegates whose example lit the way—Steve H., Mary Jo R., Derek T., Sara P., Marty L., Char V., and Bryon B.—thank you. I didn't just watch you serve; I learned how to love this Fellowship by watching you love it first. You showed me that leadership in A.A. is quiet, steady, and rooted in something deeper than personality or opinion. I carry pieces of each of you with me. To the past delegates who keep showing up — thank you for your commitment to our beloved fellowship.

To the DCMs and GSRs, the true heartbeat of Area 74—you are the pulse that keeps this whole structure alive. You are the ones who sit in cold church basements on Tuesday nights when no one else shows up. You are the ones who drive hours on icy roads so the message can reach one more group, one more newcomer, one more still-suffering alcoholic. Your courage and commitment have humbled me again and again. Serving you has been one of the greatest privileges of my life.

The future of Area 74 is not just secure—it is bright and full of promise. Our committees have been doing real, meaningful work, and their momentum depends on us. They need human hands, people willing to show up and stay willing. And they need financial support from our groups so the work can continue.

Our next slate of officers—Bill, Brent, Shane, and Elyssa—will carry us forward with the same dedication and love they have shown for so many years. Let us not rest on what has already been done. Let us choose faith over fear, refusing to be confined by "what we have always done," and instead asking, with open hearts: What might be possible? And may we move into that future with compassion, with kindness, and by making space for every voice, especially the ones that have waited the longest to be heard.

These past two years have taught me that the Traditions and Concepts are not rules — they are love in motion. The Traditions reminded me that unity is not about winning, but about staying together. The Concepts showed me that no one leads alone, and that true authority in A.A. comes only from service and sacrifice. When we place principles before personalities — when we trust the group conscience even when it breaks our hearts — something sacred happens. A loving God really does show up and do for us what we cannot do for ourselves.

I have been carried every step of the way. All the car rides across long stretches of highway, the late-night conversations, the laughter that came when I didn't think I could take one more thing, the hard truths spoken with love — those moments saved me. Area 74 took me farther than any map could trace — from the gutters of downtown Minneapolis to a life I never believed I deserved. I stand here only because you walked beside me when I could not walk alone.

As you read this, somewhere someone is being arrested. Someone is being hospitalized. Someone is getting fired, getting thrown out of their home, or contemplating suicide. And in that darkest moment, they will decide they need help.

The work we do in service ensures that when that moment comes, A.A. is there — that the hand of hope is waiting, that a meeting is available, that no alcoholic has to die because they couldn't find us.

That is why we show up. That is why this matters.

On a personal note — many of you have asked, and I haven't written about them in a long while — our beautiful dogs continue to fill our lives with joy. We are overwhelmed and honored to share that we have received an invitation to Westminster in New York City in February 2026. It is one of those moments I never imagined back when life felt small and broken — proof that sobriety keeps giving us reasons to stay grateful and amazed.

To my sponsees, who saw less of me but kept growing anyway — thank you for your grace. And to my husband, who sacrificed more than most will ever know — thank you for loving me through every mile, every meeting, every moment. Nothing about this journey was mine alone.

Area 74 — thank you for allowing me to serve you. Thank you for trusting me, stretching me, and loving me into someone new. You have given me more than I could ever repay. I leave this role not with sadness, but with a full heart and deep peace, knowing that the work continues and that we are in good hands.

Area 74 Online Chat Quick Start Guide

Our Mission

To make sure the hand of A.A. is always there for anyone who reaches out — including those who prefer to type instead of call. Your calm, kind presence can make all the difference.

How the Chat Works

Visitors to **area74.org** can type questions. These appear in Slack (through **Smallchat**) in the **#online-chat** channel.

Each message thread shows:

- 1. Where the visitor was on the website
- 2. The visitor's typed question

All chats are **anonymous** — your name and photo are not shown.

Step-by-Step Workflow

1. Watch for new chats

- a. You'll hear a "typing" sound or see a red dot in Slack.
- b. Go to the **#online-chat** channel.

2. Claim it

- a. Click the thread and send a friendly "Hi" right away.
- b. Add the •• eyeball emoji to show others you're handling it.

3. Find or write your response

- Check #committee for pinned "prepared responses."
- Copy (Ctrl + C) and paste (Ctrl + V) the message into the reply box.
- Press **Enter** to send.

4. Finish up

- If resolved, mark the thread with a **v** green check emoji.
- If it turns into a **12-Step** call, follow the phone training procedures.

5. Need help?

- Use @ to mention another volunteer.
- If urgent, call 715-558-4560.

- At least one year of continuous sobriety
- · Completion of phone training
- Access to internet and Slack
- The Slack workspace: area-74.slack.com
- Main channels:
 - #online-chat live chats from website visitors
 - #committee announcements

🖰 Tips & Expectations

- Try to reply within 5 minutes when possible.
- Be warm, brief, and kind newcomers may be anxious.
- Don't worry if you don't know everything; we support each other.
- Remember: your role is to connect, not to counsel.

Dear A.A. Friends:

Wishing you all warm fall greetings from the General Service Office. This season always brings thoughts of gratitude for the many blessings of sobriety that so many throughout the world have found as a result of the Fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. It's fitting that October begins the annual recognition of our gratitude, as it coincides with the Thanksgiving holiday in Canada and the U.S. in November. This time of year many of us reflect on the blessings our sobriety has given us and pay those blessings forward to ensure hope for the alcoholic whose sobriety begins today and for the alcoholic not yet born.

Among the many things I'm grateful for is our two-country structure and the unity it demonstrates to A.A. around the world, and the inclusiveness of our Fellowship. The composition of all three of our boards reflects this, and together we have trudged the road of happy destiny for over 90 years as the Fellowship has spread to nearly every country around the world. I am especially grateful for the many Canadian friends I have made throughout my years in A.A., which reminds me of a phrase I have often heard within the halls: "friendships in A.A. are lasting."

I recently learned of a great story from the GSO Archives of the early days of A.A. in Canada that reminds me of the wonderful example many of my Canadian A.A. friends reflect.

In 1944, a young Quebec banker named Dave B. reached a horrible alcoholic bottom. He read the Big Book, which his sister in Connecticut had previously sent him. He contacted AA Headquarters in New York and his call was answered by Headquarters secretary, Bobbie B., who told him, "we'll help you." Bobbie B. sent Dave the names of 400 Canadian alcoholics who had written the New York Office seeking help and Dave B. became what Bill W. would later call a "marathon Twelfth-Stepper," tirelessly calling on drunks. By 1949, in an astonishing spurt of growth, the Fellowship had spread across Canada, from Toronto to the Northern Territories, from the Maritime Provinces to British Columbia. Vast distances sometimes separated people from their meetings - and still do - by car, plane, snowmobile, dogsled and skis, they managed to get there.

Without a doubt, some reading this letter now are sober as a result of Dave B's efforts and the assistance he received from his sister and GSO. Today, GSO continues to deliver services to the Fellowship with the same spirit: "We'll help you!"

From its early days in 1941, when Rev. George Little, the Toronto minister and nonalcoholic, discovered the Big Book and worked tirelessly to share it with many problem drinkers, to the remarkable efforts of Dave B. and his "marathon Twelve Stepping," A.A. continues its rich history in Canada. We saw this enduring spirit front and center this summer when Vancouver, British Columbia, welcomed 33,700 members and friends from around the world to the International Convention, which marked the 90th anniversary of A.A. Several thousand local members came together to assist in hosting a joyful and memorable experience that united us all in love and service.

Reflecting on the sacrifices made by those who came before us, we can clearly see the many ways they safeguarded our Fellowship through the years and maintained the integrity of our A.A. message. Their dedication has paved the way for each of us to receive the gift of sobriety. We are now each responsible for honoring our legacy by carrying forward their example to ensure that others who have yet to find us have the same opportunity we had.

Your GSO coordinates and delivers an array of services to support members and your group's efforts to honor this legacy. The list is too long to include here, but I encourage you to learn more about them. Highlights may be found in our overview of SERVICES PROVIDED BY GSO/AAWS and our Seventh Tradition Fact Sheet. Also, several new services are added each year through actions taken at the annual General Service Conference, many of which result in special projects. Notable projects are the development of the 5th edition of the Big Book and the 4th edition of the Spanish Big Book. The implementation of projects like these often requires the formation of special trustee committees that need support and coordination. And I would be remiss not to mention our gratitude for the opportunity to plan and support the International Convention. Many of our employees provided support for the Convention, including coordinating public information opportunities, staffing various display and information booths, and working on numerous behind-the-scenes planning and logistical details. Carrying out this work is a great example of the service GSO provides to the Fellowship.

Your contributions to the General Service Board are a great expression of your gratitude for A.A. and for the substantial sacrifices made by those who came before us. They are also vital to ensure the preservation of our Fellowship for the alcoholic who still suffers.





What is Fellowship Connection?

Fellowship Connection is the General Service Office (GSO) database that stores AA Group records. DCMs have read-only access to this system, helping ensure effective communication between AA members, districts, and the General Service Office.

Why is this important information for a DCM?

DCMs play a key role in:

- Tracking new groups in their subdistricts
- Monitoring changes in GSRs
- Keeping group status updates (active/inactive)

How Does GSO Support DCMs?

The General Service Office understands that the DCM's role is essential in assisting with data stewardship, so DCMs have read-only access to Fellowship Connection as an aid to "facilitate the widely desired goals of exact information, stronger communication, & responsible use of A.A.'s resources."



Collaboration is Key!

While DCMs have read-only access in Fellowship Connection, district registrars do not. That's why DCM/Registrar teamwork is essential! Let your district registrar know if a group in your subdistrict has dissolved, but you see an "active" status for the group in Fellowship Connection so we can get it corrected or any other incorrect information you may see.

In 2024, there was a General Service Conference advisory action that "a pamphlet on the transgender alcoholic in A.A. be developed." In response, the trustees' Literature Committee has opened a call for recovery stories.

The trustees' Literature Committee is seeking stories of personal recovery from all transgender, non-binary, genderqueer, Two-Spirit, and gender non-conforming members in the A.A. structure of the United States and Canada.

The suggested format for typed manuscripts is 500-1,000 words, double spaced, in 12-point font. Handwritten manuscripts should be approximately 5 to 8 pages. Please include your complete name, address, and email/phone information on the first page of your manuscript. A copy of your manuscript should be retained for your files. The anonymity of all authors will be observed whether their story is selected for publication or not.
